CANADA'S SPORTS HALL OF FAME



Canada's Sports Hall of Fame is a Registered Canadian Charity. Our mission is to share the stories of the achievements of our Honoured Members so that we can inspire all Canadians to be the best they can be in all aspects of life. Our 40,000 square foot international award-winning facility features 12 galleries, more than 50 hands-on interactive experiences and a collection of more than 95,000 artefacts. It is a place of honour for the 548 inducted sport legends and the 62 sports they represent. Visit us to experience Canada's sport history and celebrate the contribution of sport to our country. Canada's Sports Hall of Fame fundraises annually to ensure the ongoing operation of the facility.

THE HISTORY

Canada's Sports Hall of Fame is one of North America's oldest and most prestigious sport halls with a collection of more than 95,000 artefacts. Established in 1955 thanks to Harry Price, Chairman of the Sports Committee for the Canadian National Exhibition (CNE), after traveling across the country and making the Stanley Barracks at the CNE grounds in Toronto, ON the very first home of Canada's Sports Hall of Fame.

In 2008, Calgary submitted a bid to have the Hall relocate to Alberta and build a facility all its own at Canada Olympic Park. Construction began in February 2010. Less than 18 months later, the doors opened to our 40,000 square foot home on Canada Day 2011. Now, our nation's sporting history can be preserved, celebrated and inspire current and future generations.

THE BUILDING

Canada's Sports Hall of Fame's new building was completed on schedule and on budget. The construction cost for the building was \$30 million, with funds provided by the City of Calgary (\$5 million), the Province of Alberta (\$10 million) and the Government of Canada (\$15 million).

The architect for the building was Enzo Vicenzino with Stantec and the building project manager was CANA Construction Ltd. WinSport Canada supported the relocation of Canada's Sports Hall of Fame to Canada Olympic Park by generously leasing the land to the Hall.

THE GALLERIES

There are 12 galleries with more than 50 hands-on interactive exhibits that include shadow boxing against Lennox Lewis, wheelchair racing against Chantal Petitclerc, rowing, a five sport virtual sports simulator and more.

THE GRAND HALL



The Grand Hall features the Wall of Fame displaying Canada's Sports Hall of Fame's 548 inducted Honoured Members, and the Hero Stations which allow visitors to look up profiles on each sport legend.

CANADA'S SPORT MOZAIK

The awe-inspiring and iconic mural titled "Canada's Sport Mozaik" was created by artist Jean René. A smaller version is on display inside the Hall next to the Pepsi Café.
